Rotary provides PPE to fire, police departments

On Thursday, June 18, 2020 at 2:45 PM, the Cuyahoga Falls Fire Department and Police Department received 500 N95 masks from the Cuyahoga Falls Rotary Club. They were presented to Chief Jack Davis and Chief Fred Jackson at Fire Station 5 on Wyoga Lake Road.

The April 19, 2020 edition of the Falls News Press contained a story indicating that, in addition to Western Reserve Hospital, the city's fire department was also in need of personal protective equipment. The Rotary Club had applied for a Disaster Response Grant from The Rotary Foundation on behalf of Western Reserve Hospital, so it was a great opportunity for the Rotary Club of Cuyahoga Falls to seek a grant to aid the Fire Department.

The Club's New Member Committee, chaired by Rachel Victor of the Wayne Agency, indicated to the club board of directors that her team wanted to pursue this project as a matching grant from the district.

As the process began with an informal needs assessment of both the CFPD and the CFPD, Chief Davis and Chief Jackson indicated that N95 Masks were their highest priority and the most difficult to find. The grant was approved and the club began its quest to see how many masks could be purchased in a timely fashion.

Finding N95 masks at all proved to be both difficult and expensive as demand has skyrocketed and vendors repeatedly told the club that they are unavailable right now. Then, the available Rotary — 1.2 million members worldwide, providing "Service Above Self" — presented itself.

Rick Pollak, President of Cuyahoga Falls Rotary, found a connection through a Rotarian from the Medina Rotary Club and received contact information for someone at Sewa International USA. This organization was able to secure the highly sought after face masks almost immediately. Because the request came from Rotary, this international Hindu faith-based, humanitarian, nonprofit service organization was an available resource.

The Rotary Club of Cuyahoga Falls is grateful for their help and looks forward to continuing to support our community even more in months and years to come.

Dear Viji,

Thank you for detailed and compassionate planning for a terrific dinner and shoe giveaway, while also protecting guests and staff with the donation of personal protective equipment on Sunday, July 12, 2020. The gift of 25 homemade face shields by Arnav Eidnani was an surprise and a delight. I am so glad you asked if the guests needed shoes in our preparations for the dinner donation. It was very insightful as that item is not on our [wishlist](#), however it is very much needed. You took the extra measure to call/email and investigate our specific needs.

Our guests at the shelter walk more than most, out of necessity, and shoes from clothing centers are impossible to sanitize thoroughly and are often not supportive because they are used. Some of our guests do not have one change of clothes when they arrive, and some only have flip-flops. Some guests are in pain from poor shoes. Good shoes not only protect their health from injuries and infections from open footwear) but it helps empower them to get outside the shelter to follow-through on their appointments to advance their lives toward stable housing and to just plain get a breath of fresh air and get out of the shelter's walls on a walk. The donation of new shoes was invaluable, and the guests expressed their appreciation to me for the gift of shoes from Sewa International many times over many days. We also appreciated the donation of tee shirts for our emergency clothing stash. Often it is victims of domestic violence who are the guests who arrive without a change of clothing and emergency clothes helps us decontaminate any clothing they are wearing when they enter our emergency shelter by giving them a change of clothes as we treat their clothes.

Thank you for leveraging AIPNO in to co-sponsor the dinner, as well. Pizza is always a treat for the guests of the shelter and they don't get it often. It is also very thoughtful to arrange to have some vegetarian and non-pork pizzas for our guests with dietary restrictions. The entire process of working with you and your chapter has been high-quality and sensitive.

I am grateful for your organization, Viji, of the delivery, too, so that I could get to know your organization and its programs near and far and meet young Arnav myself. I am sorry that we could not give you a tour or have you distribute the shoes or dinner yourselves inside the building due to our physical distancing protocol. I am glad so many of your members were able to at least see the courtyard and meet some staff on the day of the delivery to give you a feel for the place. The delivery gave me an opportunity to answer your members' questions about homelessness and the shelter, which, for me, is a valuable part of participating in the delivery.

This is how the Sewa International donation broke down according to my records:

I am so honored that Sewa International included us in their outreach to homeless shelters in the region. Meal delivery is always a help, and your meal was a special meal at that. During the pandemic, we have had a dropoff in meal donations because of physical distancing preventing some of our donors from making meals together like they usually do. 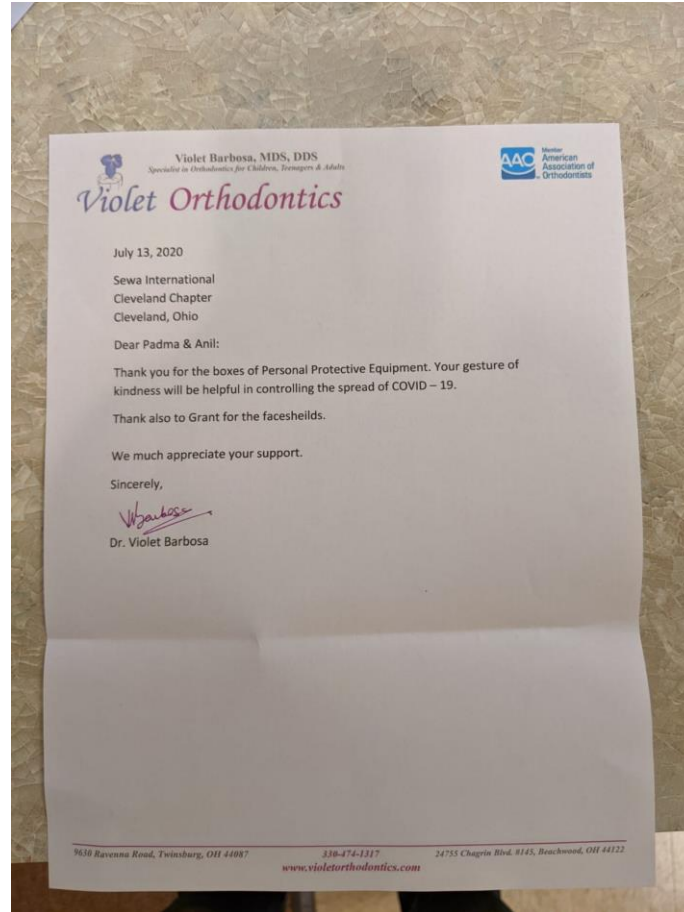

Sewa International Launches 24/7 COVID-19 Convalescent Blood Plasma Registry

Sewa International has launched a national registry for COVID-19 Blood Plasma (www.sewacovidplasma.org), a 24/7 service, that offers a national registry for both donors and recipients under the Convalescent Plasma Therapy program with live phone and social media support.

The mission is to bring together matching blood donors and COVID-19 patients seeking the plasma, in-time and save lives, and we are open round-the-clock to serve, says a Sewa press release.

What is the Convalescent COVID-19 Plasma Therapy?

Convalescent COVID-19 Plasma Therapy is an FDA regulated investigational therapy where plasma collected from eligible donors is used as therapy for a restricted class of recipient patients, both of whom have compatible blood type.

Who Can be a Plasma Donor?

A donor is:



1. Male or a non-pregnant female

2. No prior history of Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, HIV, or intravenous drug use

3. A COVID-19 survivor with either one of the following:

A. Complete resolution of symptoms at least 28 days prior to donation

OR

B. Complete resolution of symptoms at least 14 days prior to donation, AND Negative results for COVID-19 either from one or more nasopharyngeal swab specimens or by a molecular diagnostic test from blood

Who Can be a Plasma Recipient?

Recipient is a COVID-19 patient who is acutely ill with respiratory failure deemed to benefit with this therapy after discussion with his or her physician.

Sewa's registry is a mobile enabled, fully functional, self-registry service with 24/7 live phone and email support that offers both pre-screening and

donor-patient matching services.

The registry includes status updates and email communication with an automatic status change intimation.

Run by a dedicated team of Sewa volunteers, the services adhere to HIPPA medical data protection laws, and protects the privacy and confidentiality of the registered users (donors and recipients).

"A dedicated group of physicians and technologists designed and developed this registry rapidly because they saw the urgent need for such a service nationwide," said Prem Pusuloori, Sewa Director of National & International Programs.

3D Print Face Shields

Sewa Int'l launches project to create 3-D-printed face shields

IN VIEW OF the acute shortage of face shields, one of the most essential personal protective equipment (PPE) for frontline workers in the fight against Covid-19, Sewa International USA, Cleveland chapter, has started 3-D printing of face shields to help them.

Sewa International Cleveland Chapter initiated this project to help this community need, but also to engage the youth with productive use of their time and feel a sense of purpose at this time of need, said Ms. Viji Vijay, President, Sewa International USA, Cleveland chapter.

Three dedicated high school children – Grant Malorana, a sophomore from Solon High School, Krishna Mukunda, a junior from Hawkins School, and Rohan Kumar, a freshman from University High School – participated in this project with the guidance of Sewa

volunteer Sunil Narahari. The target was to produce 500 face shields in 6 weeks, by July 1st.

They have already distributed over 100 face shields to a Pizza restaurant and a subway shop in Solon and Menorah Park Senior community nursing home in Beachwood.

Said Grant, "I decided to work on SEWA face shields project to help those who are taking risks to serve others, because 3D printing is a relatively fast process compared to full-scale industrial production. It is great to volunteer and help the community at the same time."

Krishna says, "These efforts and donations are necessary at this critical time where several states and our community are reopening, and healthcare professionals and workers in many local small businesses will desperately need them. I am

proud to be involved with the project."

Rohan believes, "I joined a non-profit like SEWA as I felt that making a difference in my community is a much better use of my time, instead of wasting my time playing video games. Making face shields using 3-D printing is a very cost-efficient and fast process and I am glad to be part of this project."

Sewa International Cleveland Chapter President Viji Vijay, who initiated the project, and Chapter Director for ASPIRE program Sunil Narahari, who supervised and helped make this happen, expressed their "profound Thank you" to the participants, their parents, many Sewa volunteers and front-line workers for making this happen. According to Viji and Sunil, "It is the most satisfying feeling we get in our efforts to combat this virus and we are fortunate to be a part of this."

3D Print Face Shields

- SOLON, Ohio — The coronavirus crisis has led to people helping one another, neighbors lending a helping hand, and now teenagers are doing their part to help their community. Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), is the life-saving equipment first responders need. It's in high demand and short supply.
- That's why the leaders at the Cleveland Chapter of Sewa International decided to help. The non-profit started a six-week youth engagement program using 3D printers to make face shields.
- "We thought we should engage with the youth and also give them an opportunity to contribute to COVID-19 relief efforts," said Viji Vijay.
- Three local students are part of the program.
- "3D printing is great for architectural models. It's much better, especially in a time of crisis like we are in now, to give back to the community, said Grant Maiorana, Solon High School. The goal is to make and distribute 500 face shields by July 1.
- "3D printing is foreign to me, the fact that these kids are computer savvy and can do this for their community is a very heartwarming thing," said Mark Urlaub, R.N. Menorah Park.
- Face shields were delivered to Menorah Park on Sunday.
- "Their acts of kindness are unbelievable," said Richard Schwalberg, Chief Operating Officer Menorah Park.
- But organizers want these face shields to reach people that all of us interact with every day.
- "Think of restaurants, the servers, busboys, the pharmacists, if you can protect more people in addition to fire, police and hospitals, I think we will be able to decrease the spread," said Sunil Narahari, Sewa International Cleveland Chapter.
- The students made a special delivery to workers at Subway and Antonio's Pizza in Solon on Saturday.
- "In some cases, I can see the impact I'm having on people and to me that is humbling and it shows how someone doing an action to help other people can change another person's life," said Rohan Kumar, University School.
- "It feels pretty good because you know you're making a direct impact on someone's life," said Krishna Mukunda, Hawken School

Some doctors believe therapy shows promise

- CLEVELAND — Convalescent plasma therapy is being used to treat patients with COVID-19, and a non-profit is on a mission to bring together matching blood donors and critically-ill patients.
- Right now, there is no known cure, treatment, or vaccine for COVID-19. But, some doctors believe convalescent plasma therapy is showing promise. It is plasma donated from someone who had the virus and recovered that is given to a patient fighting the virus.
- “Convalescent serum is a source of antibodies so we can infuse these antibodies in the patients who are actually infected with COVID-19,” said Dr. Rupesh Raina, with the Association of Indian Physicians of Northern Ohio.
- But, how do you match recovered patients with critically ill patients?
- “We saw the urgent need for having this service, nothing like this was available,” said Viji Vijay, Cleveland Chapter President of Sewa International.
- That’s why the non-profit group Sewa International launched a COVID-19 Convalescent Blood Plasma Registry. View it here: [COVID-19 Plasma Registry Sewa International](#)
- The group provides a platform to connect donors and recipients nationally.
- It’s aimed at helping physicians and patients get the potentially life saving information quickly.
- The registry process is HIPPA-compliant and protects the privacy of both donors and recipients, said Vijay.
- The Cleveland Chapter of Sewa International teamed up with The Association of Indian Physicians of Northern Ohio to help spread the word about the new database. The site launched April 16.
- Right now, convalescent plasma therapy is regulated by the FDA as investigational.
- While the therapy is not yet an approved treatment, Raina said he has seen it work.
- “I’ve seen a couple of my friends they got it, they got the therapy and improved,” he said.

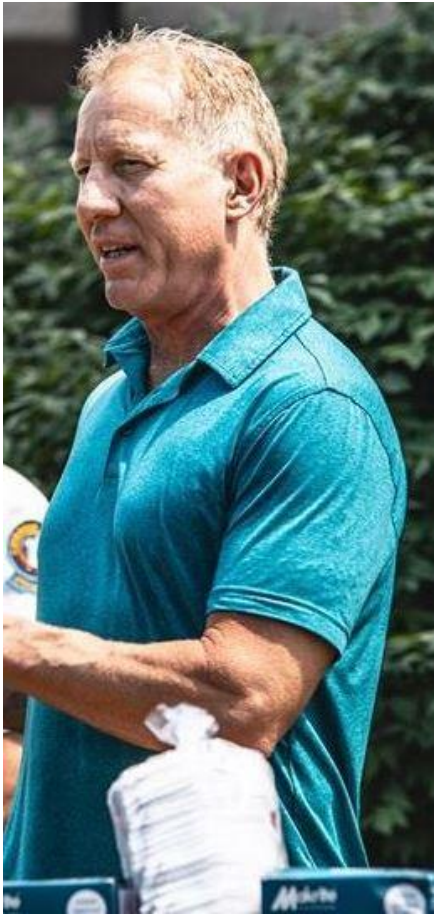
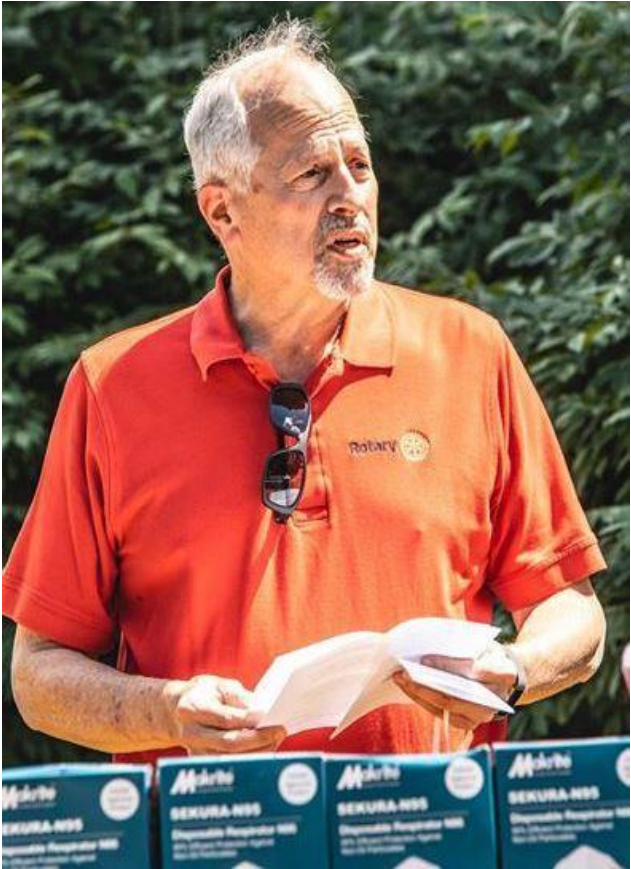

The April 19, 2020 edition of the Falls News Press contained a story indicating that, in addition to Western Reserve Hospital, the city's fire department was also in need of personal

protective equipment. The Rotary Club had applied for a Disaster Response Grant from The Rotary Foundation on behalf of Western Reserve Hospital, as well as six other area hospitals, so it was a great opportunity for the Rotary Club of Cuyahoga Falls to seek a grant to aid the Fire Department.

The Club's New Member Committee, chaired by Rachel Victor of the Wayne Agency, indicated to the club board of directors that

her team wanted to pursue this project as a matching grant from the district.

As the process began with an informal needs assessment of both the CFFD and the CFPD, Chief Davis and Chief Jackson indicated that N95 Masks were their highest priority and the most difficult to find. The grant was approved and the club began its quest to see how many masks could be purchased in a timely fashion.

Finding N95 masks at all

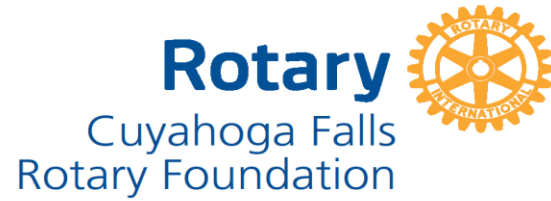
proved to be both difficult and expensive as demand has skyrocketed and vendors repeatedly told the club that they are unavailable right now. Then, the beauty of Rotary — 1.2 million members worldwide, providing "Service Above Self" — presented itself.

Rick Pollak, President of Cuyahoga Falls Rotary, found a connection through a Rotarian from the Medina Rotary Club and received contact information for someone at Sewa Interna-

tional USA. This organization was able to secure the highly sought after face masks almost immediately. Because the request came from Rotary, this International Hindu faith-based, humanitarian, nonprofit service organization was an available resource.

The Rotary Club of Cuyahoga Falls is grateful for their help and looks forward to continuing to support our community even more in months and years to come.
